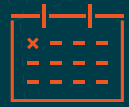

ICE BofA DIVERSIFIED CORE U.S. PREFERRED SECURITIES INDEX

SELECTION

- The index is designed to track the performance of exchange-listed U.S. dollar denominated preferred stock and convertible preferred stock publicly issued by corporations in the U.S. domestic market
- Preferred stock and notes issued in \$25, \$50, or \$100 par/liquidation preference increments must have a minimum amount outstanding of \$100 million
 - \$1000 par DRD-eligible (Dividends Received Deduction) securities must have an amount outstanding of at least \$250 million
 - Qualifying securities must be exchange listed and rated by Moody's, S&P, or Fitch (Except Convertible Preferreds)
 - In addition, qualifying securities must have an investment grade rated country of risk (based on an average of Moody's, S&P and Fitch foreign currency long term sovereign debt ratings)
- Convertible preferred stock must be exchange listed and have at least \$50 million face amount outstanding and at least one year remaining to maturity
- Qualifying securities must have a traded market value of at least \$6 million on in each of the previous three calendar months in order to qualify for inclusion

WEIGHTING SCHEME

- Index constituents are market capitalization-weighted provided the total allocation to an individual issuer does not exceed 10%
 - The face values of bonds of all other issuers that fall below the 10% cap are increased on a pro-rata basis
- Accrued interest is calculated assuming next-day settlement
- Cash flows from payments that are received during the month are retained in the index until the end of the month and then are removed as part of the rebalancing
 - Cash does not earn any reinvestment income while it is held in the index

REBALANCES/REVIEWS

- The index follows a quarterly reconstitution and rebalance schedule. Adjustments are made on the last business day in March, June, September, and December, based on information available up to and including the third business day before the last business day of the month
- Accrued interest is calculated assuming next-day settlement. Cash flows from payments that are received during the month are retained in the index until the end of the month
- Coupon cash is removed monthly on the last calendar day, as are securities that are:
 - redeemed or legally defaulted,
 - fall under the minimum amount outstanding, or
 - fall under the minimum term to maturity/conversion
